Interview Miss. Hadiyah-U-ahk Smith, The earthquakes in Turkey.

In February of 2023 Mrs. Hadiyah, our Biology teacher, visited Turkey. She was in one of the Southern cities when all those earthquakes took place. Al Hamdullilah, she came back safe to the states.

I-What was your reaction to the earthquake Hitting Turkey?

I was dreaming away in my bed when I felt the bed shaking and heard the chandelier rattling. I woke up a bit confused and bewildered. "What was going on?" I thought to myself. I saw my sis-in-law run down the hall and then she started screaming my name. I rubbed my eyes and frantically got dressed. I was trying to hurry as I heard the panic in their voices. "Was this normal?" I thought to myself. I went outside to try and get more information about what was going on. I was wondering if this was an earthquake. Was I actually living through a natural disaster? Neighbors were running out of their houses and off their properties into the street. My husband told me that Turkey normally gets earthquakes, but this one was bigger than normal. We decided to go out to the street as well. Walking and standing were difficult as the earth shook. It felt like a roller coaster ride. We stood around for a bit, and then sat in the car as it was cold outside.

2-Where were you when the first earthquake hit and what day was it? I was in Adana, and the earthquake hit. I remember, it was a school day.

3-Did you move after you heard the Earthquake news, and where? If you were transported from your Tukey where did you go and how and which country? Some people started to leave. We drove around the area for a bit, waiting for everything to calm down. When we thought it was safe. We went back inside. However, moments later another earthquake came through and we went rushing outside again. When things settled for a bit we turned on the news and saw the destruction in the nearby areas. Throughout the day the electricity was cutting in and out and I debated if I should work. I then decided to start working before learning another big earthquake was going to come through. I took the rest of the day off and prepared to leave. We went to the family farm and waited.
